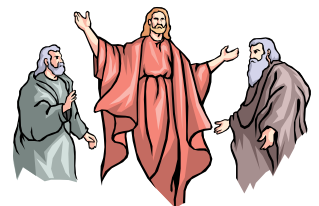
What a gift our parish received yesterday as we had Dr. Scott Hahn come and speak to us about these glorious gifts that our Lord bestows on us through the Church every single day. As I sat and listened, I longed for every single member of my parish community to be able to hear Dr. Hahn’s transformative testimony and his unique view on the richness of our faith. I took copious notes throughout his presentation particularly on his talk about the Mass. He spoke of how he first experienced the Mass as an observer when he was a Presbyterian and how he slowly started to see Jesus reveal himself through the reading of the Scriptures and the Breaking of the Bread just as Christ had done with the disciples of Emmaus. Dr. Hahn explained how he felt at this heavenly banquet that we as Catholics, including this unworthy priest, so often take for granted. We long for heaven and all the glories that God has in store for us, but the last thing I wrote from Dr. Hahn on my legal pad was this: “We don’t have to die to go to heaven. All we have to do is go to Mass!”

All those beautiful heavenly images and hymns that were revealed to St. John in the Book of Revelation are present right here when we celebrate the Eucharist. What a gift!

We don’t have to travel up to Mount Tabor to experience the Transfigured Christ. We experience him right here! Right here in the Mass, as we receive this heavenly food, it is Christ himself that begins to change our lowly bodies to conform with his glorified body as St. Paul tells us in the second reading. Which means that during this weekly encounter, during this weekly celebration, during this weekly participation of “heaven on earth”, when we receive Christ’s very flesh in Holy Communion, we too are transfigured as Christ was on that mountain.

What a gift!

Which is why we must never take what we do here for granted, but ask, beg, and implore the Lord to give us the faith to be able to clearly see this heavenly reality unfold in our humble little church around this humble little table. Here we become transfigured. Here we become one body. Here we become divine!

Forgiveness



Louis Smedes, author of several books on forgiveness, notes that we do not forgive simply because we are supposed to forgive. We forgive because we need to be healed. Forgiveness is said to have three stages. I don't deny what the person did nor do I pretend it wasn't wrong. But...

Instead of identifying the person totally with what they did to hurt me, I begin to see them as a person like me - imperfect but still someone God loves.

I give up my 'right' to get even. Vengeful thoughts do not make the other person suffer. They hurt me. So, I just plain rinse my mind of those kind of thoughts.

I stand next to the Lord and together with him look at the other person. For sure Jesus wants good things to happen to them. So, with the Lord's help (and some struggle), I begin to look at the other person the way the Lord does.
